Study Course Abstract

The course is intended for the students of the bachelor programme "Eastern culture and business communication" students. The course aims to introduce students to the significant achievements of the Eastern European cinema. The course deals with the chronological order of the Eastern European cinema stages of development in different national traditions. Particular attention is paid to the film structure, poetics, drama and directing.

Course Plan
